Special thanks are due to all those who looked after the Club's equipment, the splendid new feather banner and especially the tent – a welcome haven of companionship and shelter, especially from the snow on the Relay day.

At the Club AGM on 15<sup>th</sup> March the Secretary, Treasurer and Chairman were all re-elected unopposed. Ian Lawson has taken over the important role of Fixtures Secretary from Dil Wetherill, who is becoming Club Coach and Training Officer. Ursula Oxburgh is stepping down after making a fine contribution to WAOC in the important role of Events Convenor, to be replaced by Peter Woods – and Hazel Bickle has kindly agreed to organise the Summer Galloppen events. Thanks were expressed at the meeting to all these volunteers; the committee is still on the lookout for a Publicity Officer and someone to take on Junior Development.

A motion was carried at the AGM that paper copies of Jabberwaoc should no longer be sent automatically to all members of WAOC, but would be available on-line as it is now – so that anyone who wanted copies on paper would be expected to apply for that. The committee will now consider the arrangements for doing this, presumably from January 2009 with a reduced membership subscription and an appropriate charge for Jabberwaoc on paper.

## **Colour Coded Awards**

You are all familiar with arriving at a local Orienteering event and choosing which 'colour' of course to run, you are usually faced with a range of choices from White for absolute beginners and youngsters to Brown for the experts. You may not be aware that there is also a system whereby you

can obtain 'Colour Coded Badges' which can be proudly worn on your tracksuit or pinned to the wall somewhere in the house.

This scheme is intended for youngsters and adults and is a means of marking your progress through the stages of difficulty that the different coloured courses present.

To qualify for a badge you have to complete three courses of the same colour on your own and achieve the 'standard' for that course.

On a White course everyone who completes the course meets the standard.

On all other courses you have to do the course in less than the 'standard time'. There are two ways to define the standard time and whichever method includes most people is the one used. The two methods are

- 1. 50% of the competitors who started the course.
- 2. All the competitors within 150% of the winner's time.

The published results from an event should show the standard times for each course.

If you have done three courses meeting the standard you are entitled to claim your badge. To do this you need to contact me, Ian Smith, let me know which three events qualify you for your badge and I will send you your badge, free of charge.



# **Summer Mid-week Galoppen 2008**

The **Galoppen** is a series of fun orienteering courses held locally on Wednesday evenings. You may remember the prizes for last year's Junior and Senior Men and Women were given out at the AGM The system of awarding points results in a higher final score if you take part in more events. I actually won a Cadbury's crème egg this year but this came at a price as I also won the prize of coordinating this year's series.

It is good to get a run on sunlit evenings with starts usually 6-7pm so WAOC members and friends can come after work to compete in these informal events with just two courses. These have varied in design using a minimum of equipment with controls of lettered plastic cups on a conventional colour coded style course to a Street O where you write down the numbering on specific lampposts. We have had quizzes and one event was based on Sudoku, where I got into trouble for wanting to finish the Sudoku rather than hand in my control card!



These low-key events are ideal for anyone thinking of starting to plan events or old hands inventing imaginative new courses. ## 3) Chairman's Report – Chris Morley

On the face of things, the past year has been a fairly ordinary one for the Club, with no Regional Event in the Thetford Thrash, and no world-ranking Middle Distance races at Rowney Warren. WAOC has nevertheless put on during the year four District events, one Night Event, one Try-O, six SMILES and eight Summer Galloppen events - and I should like to thank to all those WAOC members who organised and planned the events, and all the large number of people who

helped. As an amateur sport we rely entirely on voluntary contributions from willing members, and it is heartwarming to see this help continuing - without it the Club could not exist.

During the year the Club and individual members have had a number of successes in Orienteering competition out in the forest - notably our juniors. May I congratulate all our various winners and champions. For the first time ever the Club has made its way through to the final round of the CompassSport Cup – due to a splendid victory over NOR at Brandon in January. The final will be at Sutton Park in October, and all members of WAOC are urged to attend it at all possible – it is likely that the Club will organise transport by coach.

The past year has certainly not been an uneventful one for the Committee, and the Junior Sub-committee has also continued to meet regularly. New officers, Secretary and Treasurer as well as Chairman, were elected at the last AGM, and since then there have been several changes in other offices - Mike Capper has taken over from Julia Crook as Editor of Jabberwaoc (and is doing a great job); Ian Lawson has taken over as Fixtures Secretary from Dil Wetherill, who is switching to become Club Coach and Training Officer; and quite soon Peter Woods will taking over from Ursula Oxburgh as Events Convenor. I should like to thank all the previous officers on behalf of us all, and wish the new officers well- and add a special word of thanks to Ursula, who has done over many years, and continues to do, a tremendous amount for WAOC. Perhaps I should add that we are still seeking a Publicity Officer and a Junior Development Officer.

Matters considered by the Committee over the year have included the fact that with prospective expenditure the Club is not quite so healthy financially as it used to be; lengthy consideration of possible designs of new O-tops for the Club, where Graham Louth is we think coming up trumps; acquisition of a splendid new feather banner to mark out the Club tent at events; an arrangement to encourage members to take Jabberwaoc on line but not on paper, by a reduced entry fee to one event in the year; a proposal to urge all Club-only members to become BOF local members; and mapping of existing and possible new areas for Orienteering. So there is a lot going on, as well as the regular month-to-month organising of events.

As your Chairman I attended an Extraordinary General Meeting of BOF last October, at which future development of the sport was discussed, and also a proposed re-organisation of the different categories of O-event, with Regional and District events possibly being amalgamated into a single Standard category - doubtless we shall hear more about that over the next few months.

## 4) Captain's Report

Unfortunately Steve Hinshelwood was unable to attend due to sickness but Chris Morley reported our success in the Compass Sport Cup and wished to encourage as many as possible to participate in the final on 19<sup>th</sup> October. The club hopes to arrange a coach.

# 5) Treasurers Report & Acceptance of Accounts

Club Treasurer Helen Bickle presented the annual accounts and reported that they had been audited and approved by Peter Haynes. The meeting approved the accounts as presented. Proposed: Caroline Louth, Seconded: John Barker

Helen made the following comments:

2007 has been a financially healthy year. Despite the fact the Thetford Thrash, usually a money-spinner, raised less than £200 due to the higher British Orienteering levy on regional level events, the other events more than made up for it. Membership subs are also higher than

anticipated. This is partly due to the increased fees but has also been artificially increased by more people paying earlier with many 2008 subs paid in 2007.

The £400 paid into other income and out of miscellaneous expenditure is from the club dinner at the Scottish Six Day. Overall there has been a surplus of just over £1,300. However we are writing off the old o-top stock, which still leaves a surplus of £1,120. This has increased the club's net assets, excluding equipment, to £7,220. This includes £313 in the Junior Fund.

Looking on to 2008, we are going to spend more. The levies the club has to pay for each competitor at events have increased slightly again this year. The British Orienteering's senior levy has increased to £1.20 and the junior levy to 25p. The East Anglian Orienteering Association's levy and SI hire charge have not changed. However the SI equipment charged per senior competitors has increased from 50p to 75p. This has meant that we have had to increase our charges for district events by 50p per junior and £1 per senior. However the prices for Gallopen and local events have not changed. We will be spending slightly more on relays as the club has reached the Compass Sport Cup Final. We will have to use some of the club's reserve to cover the cost of the extensive mapping planned but we still expect to have a healthy bank balance of over £4000 at the end of 2008.

#### 6) Awards and Presentations 2007

# Chairman's Awards 2007 - Chris Morley

One of the Chairman's most difficult tasks each year is deciding to whom to present our various major awards at this Meeting. So many people do such a lot for the Club, and deserve proper recognition. However, only a few can be singled out each year. We do have a list, carefully preserved by Anne Duncumb, of those given awards in previous years, to guide this years' selection.

**The Owl Trophy** is for the senior member, man or woman, most successful in Orienteering events over the past year. Several members of the Club have done well, including some very good newcomers to WAOC, but looking at the BOF ranking lists there is one person who has more ranking points than a contemporary who took the Owl a few years ago - and who did supremely well on what I had hoped was a quite tricky Chocolate course at the Therfield Night event that I recently planned, rushing round in a very fast time - and so I am presenting the Owl to our Club Captain, **Steve Hinshelwood.** 

The Tortoise Trophy is for outstanding contribution to the Club and its affairs. Again, there were a number of people to whom this trophy could have gone - including in particular Julia and Rolf Crook who have recently left to live in Leeds but who both contributed outstandingly to W AOC while here. However, in view of the great contribution that families make to this Club, and numerous outstanding parts she has played in our affairs, now moving strongly into developing Orienteering in local schools, I am awarding the Tortoise to our previous Chairman, Caroline Louth.

**The Chairman's Cup** is for our most outstanding junior orienteer. Many of our juniors have done well this year, but looking at the splendid series of successes that he has had, in major events, I do not think that there is any doubt but that this Cup should be presented with hearty congratulations to **Thomas Louth.** 

**The Hally Hardie Mapping Trophy** newly presented by Lindsey Freeman and Hally Hardie. This is intended for the person who has made the greatest recent contribution by going out mapping in the forest. I hope that it will indeed encourage W AOC members to go out mapping several of our

existing areas need to have their maps updated, and we have a few new areas in prospect (Monks Wood near Sawtry, and Cavenham Heath near Mildenhall). Over the past decade several Club members have done a good deal of mapping, but effort has perhaps declined in the past year or two - indeed it is arguable that the trophy should go to Hally himself. However, nowadays there is another aspect to mapping, namely looking after and updating our archive of maps on the OCAD computer system, and in recognition of that as well as his work in the forest I am presenting the Hardie Trophy to **Neil Humphries.**

#### **Junior Successes**

Once again WAOC sent 2 handicap teams to compete in the Peter Palmer Night into Day Relays last September. For WAOC1 Edward Louth had an excellent first leg run, handing over to Jonny Cronk for the second night leg. Jacqueline Heybrock (dawn Light Green leg), Thomas Hemingway (Orange), Beth Barker, Catherine Reilly and Alice Rigby (Yellow) all had steady runs leaving the long Green leg to Thomas Louth who brought the team home in a very creditable 9th place out of 21. WAOC2 was led out by Sophie Louth, with Katy Woods taking on the second night leg. Ben Armitage (dawn Light Green) Matt Haynes (Orange) and Felix Barker (Yellow) left James Haynes to complete the last long leg in style. Once again, as so often for junior events, it was Emit punching and unfortunately 2 of the WAOC2 team mispunched – only too easy with Emit, as many seniors

know to their cost.

In the Yvette Baker Trophy Regional Round, held at our Mildenhall event, WAOC juniors turned out in force. We were beaten by only 9 points by Octavian Droobers from Coventry (who carried a bye into the final because they were in the top 5 last year) but beat SOS (our nearest EA rivals) by an amazing 124 points. Our scorers were:

Everyone else contributed to our resounding success by pushing other runners down the scoring, so it was a very good team effort: well done WAOCiuniors.

The Final of the Yvette Baker Trophy, held near Scunthorpe, was a long drive for everyone so many thanks to the 16 who turned out, particularly Simon Gardner, our former junior captain, who came all the way from Edinburgh.

William Louth heads the list this time with 100 points from a win on Yellow Boys, followed by Thomas Louth (3rd on L Green boys), Simon Gardner (6th on Green Boys), Thomas Hemingway, Edward Louth, Kate Collins, James Haynes and Jonathan Heybrock and to complete a Louth quartet, Sophie just missed out on the list by one place.

WAOCjuniors newsletter: February/March 2008

Phew, that's been a busy time and I guess more busy orienteering weekends are coming up! Since the last newsletter midway through February, the East Anglian champs have taken place at King's Forest, and I am pleased to announce that a number of WAOC juniors now have the title of "2008 East Anglian Champion":

- Alexandra Fox as a W10
- Jacqui Heybrock as a W20
- William Louth as an M10
- Thomas Louth as an M14
- **Jonny Cronk** as an M16
- **Edward Louth** as an M20

The first National event of the season took place at Big Wood on 9<sup>th</sup> March, with the first round of the Future Champions' Cup (a league competition for M/W18's and 20's, which runs throughout the spring each year and concludes with a league final). Midway through March, some of the older juniors who've gone off to University have taken part in the BUSA (British Universities') Championships hosted by Sheffield and, of

course, we've had the Jan Kjellstrom orienteering festival, one of the highlights of the orienteering calendar just taking place over the rather snowy Easter weekend.

In compiling this newsletter, it is great to scroll through many of the results from events further afield and read about a number of successful runs from many of WAOC's juniors – but just as good as the results at the big events, it's great to see many of you, especially the newer club members, running at the more local events and gradually gaining your colour coded badges and certificates. So keep that up!

As for the events coming up over the next couple of months, I will mention the British Sprint/Middle distance championships event, which is due to take place over the weekend of  $5^{th}/6^{th}$  of April in the Coventry area and of course the main British Championships event, which will be in Culbin Forest in Scotland this year  $(19^{th}/20^{th}$  April) – I think it will be well worth going to one or both of those given that quality of the areas and competition.

Many of you are aware of the Peter Palmer junior team relays in September. There is also an adult version of the same event, the Harvester relay, which will be taking place over the weekend of  $17^{th}/18^{th}$  May this year, held in Hambleden in the South Central region. I mention it because there is a competition for the top junior only team as part of this relay (5 juniors are needed for a full team) and WAOC has entered this in the past. As the event is very close this year and easily accessible, some of you may be interested in competing. If you are keen to run the Harvester, then contact either Steve Hinshelwood, the club captain or Edward Louth, the junior captain, as soon as possible so that they can work out whether to enter a team.

Before I move on to general results, I wanted to congratulate **Thomas Louth** who was selected to run for England at the Interland competition in Weerterbergen in the Netherlands on the 2<sup>nd</sup> March. Even better, he then proceeded to win the M14 class at the competition by a huge margin of about 3 minutes so congratulations to Thomas!

#### Results:

It's been a busy month and a half or so, and there are results to speak about it too. Over the weekend of  $16^{th}/17^{th}$  February our neighbouring clubs Suffolk OC and Norfolk OC hosted the <u>Punch weekend</u> of East Anglian orienteering at <u>Hockham</u> and <u>King's Forest</u>, incorporating the East Anglian Championships as already mentioned above. Apart from seeing some WAOC juniors becoming EA champions, there were also some other commendable results. On the Saturday (Hockham), the following did particularly well:

- Edward Louth finished 2<sup>nd</sup> of 4 on JM5L, trailing behind winner by only 1:04min
- Thomas Louth was 1<sup>st</sup> of 3 on JM5M of 3, with **Jonny Cronk** 2<sup>nd</sup>, finishing 7 minutes behind Thomas
- **Sophie Louth** won JW5L
- **Matthew Haynes** won JM4 of 7 runners
- **Thomas Hemingway** won JM3 (of 6), with **Mihir Chandraker** placed 3<sup>rd</sup> on the same course
- Catherine Hemingway was 1<sup>st</sup> with Alexandra Fox 2<sup>nd</sup> on JW1

On 9<sup>th</sup> March, SARUM, the Wiltshire orienteering club, held a <u>national event on Big Wood</u> in the Salisbury plain, with a select few WAOC members attending. Well done to the following juniors on their commendable results:

- William Louth was 8<sup>th</sup> of 14 on M12A
- Thomas Louth finished 4<sup>th</sup> of 14 on M14A
- **Jonathan Cronk** was 10<sup>th</sup> of 26 on M16A
- **Simon Gardner** ended up 6<sup>th</sup> of 13 on M20L

The following weekend, over the 15<sup>th</sup>/16<sup>th</sup> March, the British Universities orienteering championships (known as BUSA) were hosted by Sheffield University, with Saturday's individual race held on Stanton Moor in the Peak District. Still a junior, and last year's junior captain, **Simon Gardner** ran for Edinburgh University and finished 20<sup>th</sup> of 59 within the strong field of the Men's A course. The hills up in Edinburgh must be good for training?!?

Throughout the Easter weekend (21<sup>st</sup>-24<sup>th</sup> March 2008), the traditional Jan Kjellstrom festival of orienteering took place, with some interesting snowy conditions to contend with as well as the courses themselves. This year's event was in the South East region, with events taking competitors from the University of Surrey sprint race, through to the intricate area of Leith Hill and the more physical Ashdown Forest for the individual races and finally to Eridge Old Park where the relays took place. Despite the weather, everyone seemed to enjoy themselves, and a number of WAOC juniors brought back some successful results too. In the sprint race on Good Friday, these were:

- William Louth won M10 (of 15 runners) with a 3 minute lead
- **Thomas Louth** won M14 (of 50 runners)
- **Jonny Cronk** was 18<sup>th</sup> and James Haynes finished 23<sup>rd</sup> (of 62 runners) on M16
- **Simon Gardner** was 7<sup>th</sup> (out of 22) on M20E
- Susha Chandraker finished 20<sup>th</sup> with Sophie Louth close behind in 25<sup>th</sup> (of 43 runners) on W16 The results of Days 2 and 3 (Leith Hill and Ashdown Forest) are combined together to give the overall JK results, and WAOC juniors had some great overall results, as well as some individual good runs on one of the two days. So for the individual days, well done to:
  - William Louth for winning M10A overall, with a lead of over 6 minutes after winning both days
  - **Ben Wetherill** who ended up 5<sup>th</sup> on M10B (of 11 finishers) with a consistent 5<sup>th</sup> place on both days
  - **Thomas Hemingway** who finished 19<sup>th</sup> (of 48) on M12A on Day 1
  - **Thomas Louth** who was 4<sup>th</sup> overall (of 51) on M14A, with a 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> place on the two respective days
  - **Jonny Heybrock** finished 8<sup>th</sup> of 21 on M14B on Day 2

course and seemed to enjoy it. On the results front, well done to:

- **Jonny Cronk** was 16<sup>th</sup> of 59 overall on M16A, with a great 12<sup>th</sup> place on Day 2
- **Simon Gardner** was 19<sup>th</sup> and **Edward Louth** 20<sup>th</sup> overall (of 46 both day finishers) on M20E (the men's junior elite course), with Simon's top result being 17<sup>th</sup> on Day 2 and Edward's 14<sup>th</sup> on Day 1
- **Jacqui Heybrock** who was 4<sup>th</sup> overall (of 11) on W18S, with an especially good result on Day 2 where she finished 2<sup>nd</sup> on W18S, with a 10<sup>th</sup> fastest time of the 165 people running her course that day
- Clare Woods (another ex-junior captain of WAOC) was 3<sup>rd</sup> of 10 on W20L on Day 1 Finally, the relays took place on Easter Monday. First leg runners might have encountered some snow whilst out on their courses, but nowhere near as much as the later runners. Nevertheless, everyone completed their

- WAOC, with **Jonny Heybrock**, **William Louth** and **Matthew Haynes**, were 13<sup>th</sup> of 21 on M/W40-, with Jonny bringing the team from 13<sup>th</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> during his run
